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A LESSON ON TEACHING ABOUT 9-11: SOME CULTURAL RESPONSES AND THEIR MEANING Paul Dickler

Grades: 7-12

Time: 2-4 days

Objectives:

To assess the impact of the events of 9-11 on the United States' culture during the past decade.

To reexamine the emotions and actions of people on 9-11.

To speculate what it would have been like to be a passenger on one of the hijacked planes (with viewing the film UNITED 93).

To develop an awareness of the literature now available on the terrorist attacks of 9-11 and the "war on terrorism."

National Standards: Era 10 Contemporary United States:

Standard 2: Economic, social, and cultural developments.

Background:

The terrorist attacks of 9-11 obviously had a profound effect on the United States — the loss of life, the property and economic destruction, the shift in foreign policy, and the subsequent shift in military policy. The cultural and societal effects have taken form over a somewhat longer period of time. Dozens of songs have been written concerning the attacks. Numerous films have been produced about 9-11 and terrorism. This lesson seeks to focus on these two types of responses. Teachers, of course, could choose just one form—music or film. The lyrics of four of the better known songs about 9-11 are reproduced below, as is a list of many other songs. The film involved in this lesson is also described below.

Procedures:

Teachers must use their personal judgment as to which songs might best suit their teaching needs and classroom circumstances. Nearly all of these songs can be heard on-line; their lyrics can similarly be downloaded. This lesson can be done as an individual student assignment or with groups of students doing either the same, or different songs. Several steps are involved in this lesson:

- 1. First, ask the students where they were on 9-11 and to describe their immediate reactions to the events. This can be done as a group in class or privately as a written assignment.
- 2. Next, the student(s) should listen to the preapproved songs and carefully read the lyrics.
- 3. A "College Board" style SOAPSTone analysis should then proceed for each song. S=subject, O=occasion, A=audience, P=purpose, S= speaker, T=tone. In what ways are the songs different with regard to these dimensions?
- 4. Which songs are the most effective in reaching the audience? Explain your reasoning.
- 5. Describe what, if anything, can be learned about the terrorist attacks and their effects from these songs.
- 6. Meeting together as a class, share different students reactions to these songs and discuss the responses.
- 7. Ask students what changes to their original perceptions of 9-11 have occurred, if any, over time. Discuss.
- 8. Examine the bibliography at the end of this lesson to learn more about the events on 9-11.

The Film Portion of this Lesson:

One film is highlighted in this lesson:

UNITED 93, directed by Paul Greengrass, was released on April 28, 2006.

This film comes as close as possible to recreating, in live time from take-off, what it was liked to be on Flight 93 on the morning of September 11, 2001. Many of the film participants, such as traffic controllers and military personnel, play themselves in the film. Exhaustive research tried to recreate the actual events that occurred on the flight on its way to destruction in Shanksville, Pennsylvania. United's Flight 93 was originally intended to strike the Capitol Building in Washington, DC, just 20 minutes later. The film is gripping and terrifying, even though the outcome is well known. If teachers choose to use this film, it could be seen independently by students, watched in its entirety as a class, or be viewed in excerpts. Again, teachers must be warned of the language and violence in this film.

Discussion questions may include the following:

- 1. Assess the motivations of hijackers <u>Ahmed al-Nami</u>, <u>al-Haznawi</u>, United 93's skyjacking leader <u>Ziad Jarrah</u>, and <u>Saeed al-Ghamdi</u>, as postulated in this film.
- 2. Determine what additional measures air traffic controllers and the military POTENTIALLY could have taken.
- 3. Describe the circumstances of the passengers aboard the flight.
- 4. Identify the heroic actions of the passengers and crew on board.
- 5. Identify the ways that the behavior of those on board has influenced future actions on U.S. aircraft?
- 6. List the security lessons learned from the experience of United 93.
- 7. In what ways have these events entered American culture?
- 8. Examine the bibliography below to learn more about the events on September 11, 2001.
